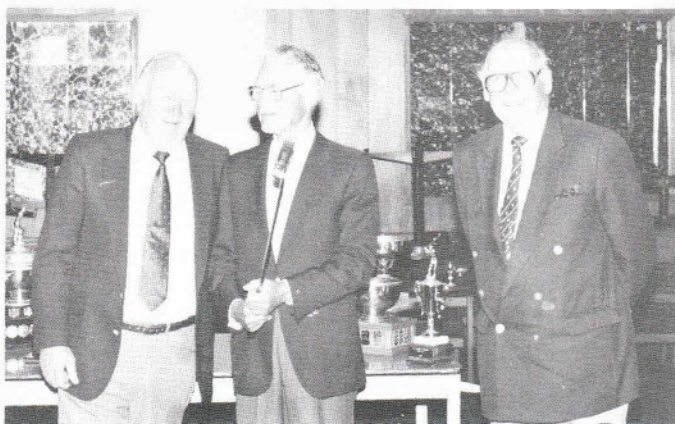

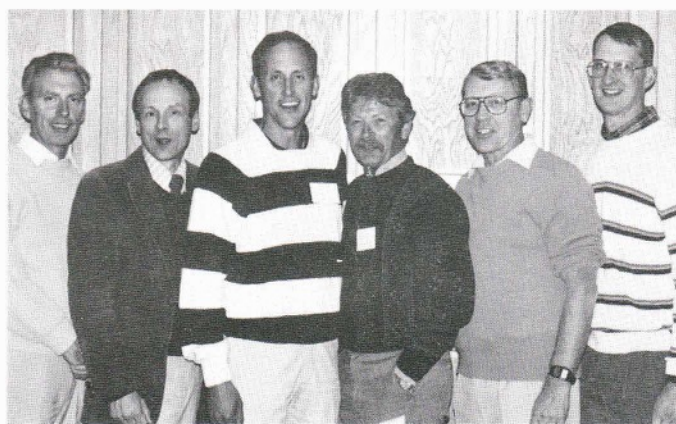

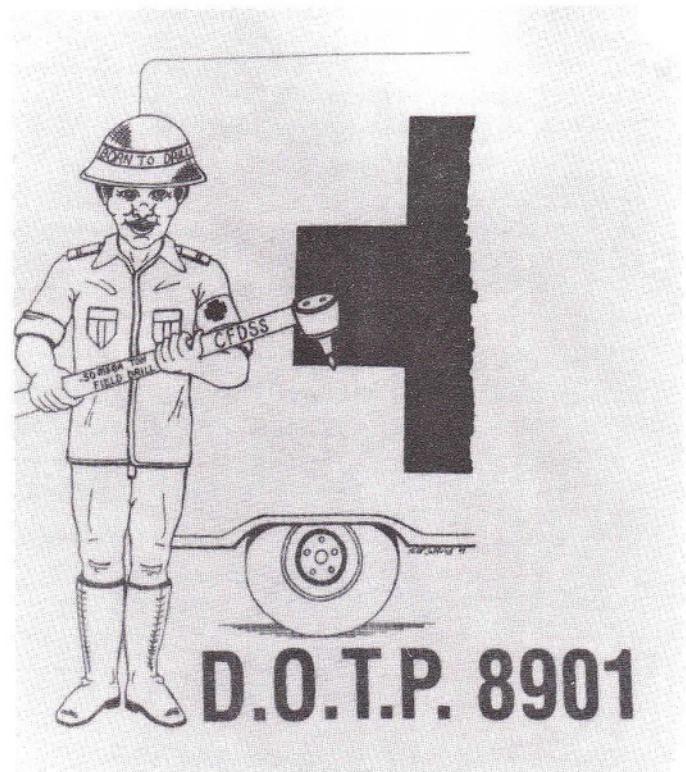

Room (BOR). "Its the Stone Frigate pass the Yard Arm on your port side" said the Commissionaire.

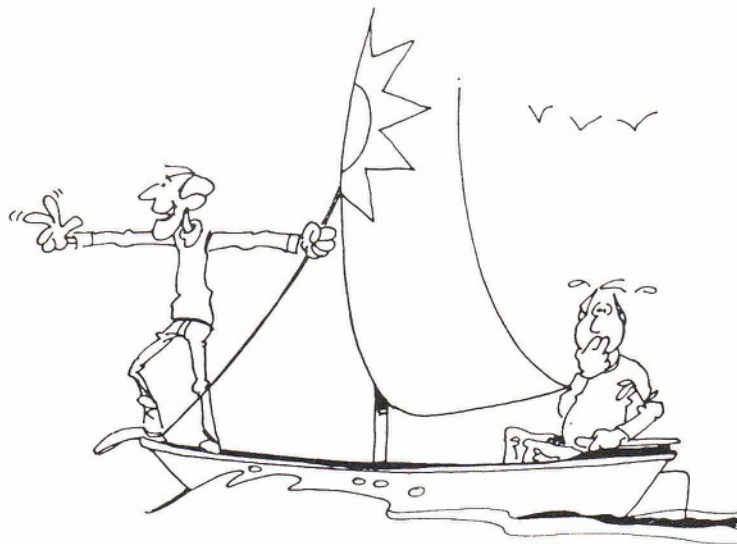
"Pardon me", I replied.

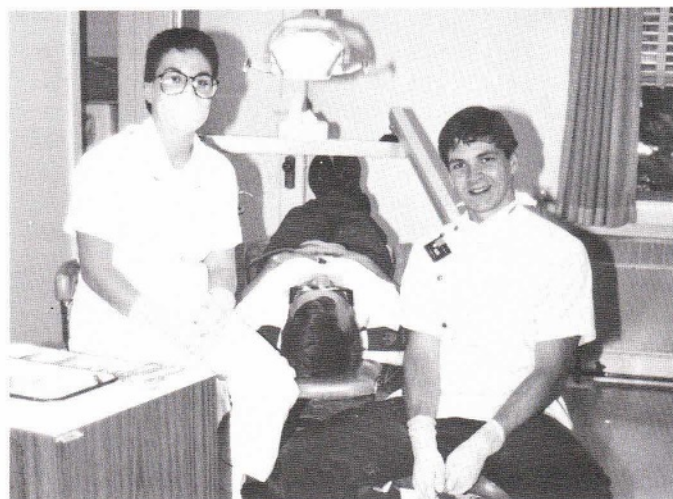

Samplory 89 – Dental Hygiene Aspect

Destination Puerto Vallarta, Ecuador, Costa Rica, Acapulco, San Diego, San Francisco – the trip of a life time, they said. Well it sure was!

The preparations for the deployment were standard. I went home for supper and told my family that I would be going on what they assume is a Silver Wing Holiday with the Navy, starting in April and returning at the end of June. After the family negotiations were completed, there were the Dental preparations: checking out the portable ADEC equipment; having it loaded; getting the top bunk in the mess; and also meeting the people you're going to be living with for awhile.

On the morning after the night before, there was the emotional good bye's on the jetty, and we cast off in a Four Squadron (Training Sqn) 260 class Destroyer HMCS QU'Appelle, along with HMCS MacKenzie, HMCS Saskatchewan, and our oil tanker supply ship HMCS Provider. The Dental team consisted of Capt Dionne, Cpl Belanger and myself. Our primary objective was to conduct the Phase one and two portions of the DCP program for the ships company. The three Destroyers were training ships, so the standard of performance on board was very high.

Our first day at sea was calm. The dental team managed to get set up, and rifle through about twenty five Phase One's. There are a few times when the routine of the ship is not to be interfered with. Those times are cleaning stations in the morning, meal hours, and the evening movies, not counting battle stations, man overboard drills, mock fire drills, and the various states of readiness. Once the dental team learned to work around these daily routines, we knew there was light at the end of the tunnel. Phase Ones took a week and Capt Dionne and Cpl Belanger jackstayed (tight wire act) over to HMCS MacKenzie via HMCS Provider during a refueling (RAZ), to carry on with Phase Ones.

Performing the Phase two's however, was a real challenge. The conditions were maybe not ideal, but certainly bearable. First you had to achieve an understanding with the sick bay Tiffy (DOC), that you will be invading his privacy, when he has examinations and emergencies to deal with. My hat goes off to these Senior Med As. They certainly have a lot of responsibilities in a detached environment. A routine was worked out whereby sick bay routines were completed by 1100 hrs. Dental Hygiene appointments began at 1100 hrs, resumed after the meal hour, and ended just prior to the 2000 hr movie. Working with your patient on an examining table that has no adjustment opened the way for ingenuity. The operators chair was an adjustable bar type stool. It was more than adequate, but it did not have wheels. An extension to the portable ADEC stand had to be constructed by the Hull Tech's to raise the level of the unit, thereby reducing the tension on the handpiece from the handpiece cables. Lighting was fixed and abundant in sick bay, but not manageable. A focusable battery operated damage control light was affixed to some head gear, and provided co-ordinated movement of operator and patient. After these efforts, it was time for a break. Besides we had just arrived in Puerto Vallarta.

After developing a good relationship with the Snr NCMs on board, I managed to be part of the advance party when we land-

ed in Puerto Vallarta. We conducted some administration on behalf of the mess, tested the traditional tequila, and returned to the ship. Heat!! you must experience. As for Puerto Vallarta, what can I say, sun, sand, salsa, friendly's from Toronto and Calgary (off-season tourists). After five days and multiple sunburns, it became unbearable, so we cast off again, destination Ecuador.

The post Puerto Vallarta GI syndrome set in about two to three days at sea. A fair portion of the ships company fell pray to Kaopectate and more powerful remedies. A few days later Capt Dionne and Cpl Belanger left the Squadron, in HMCS Provider, heading home.

In the tenth day at sea, we were approaching the equator. Many things began to happen prior to the cross of the line. All food was dyed green, and had to be eaten. One was treated poorly by all that were called shellbacks. You were considered a tadpole til you crossed the Equator for the first time. Proof was necessary, otherwise you may have had to spend the day handcuffed to a pipe. The actual ceremony was beyond belief, and everyone had a good time. No one was excluded from clean up and painting of the ship.

The three Destroyers arrived at the coast of South America the next day, sailing up the river to Guayaquil Ecuador. Upon arrival a multitude of dental sick parades were attended to. CUD repairs, IRMs, temp crowns and the like. Not much tourist activity occurred, due to the instability in the region at the time. The climate was very hot and humid, and most members stayed close to the ships. Several days later, a transfer to HMCS MacKenzie, and a northward sailing, for a four day visit to Costa Rica.

Certainly the most beautiful and picturesque South American country visited the deployment. A few of us had decided to take one of the ten most popular train rides in the world. The six hour jungle train over the mountains, to the Caribbean coast of Costa Rica. We had a swim in the Caribbean, jumped on a three hour bus ride back to San Jose, with a connection to Caldera on the west coast, another swim, and back to work in the evening. Ap-

proximately sixty percent of the ships company received dental cleanings at this time. A return to HMCS QU'APPELLE for the remainder of deployment allowed for ninety-four percent of that ships company to be completed.

Sailing northward to Acapulco was hard to take. Entering the harbour from the ocean was quite a view. Using big eye to scan the coast line, was more than entertaining. Dental sick parades were conducted, patients were screened, and one required a radiograph and diagnosis from a local Dentist. We enjoyed good bartering and shopping on the hotel strip, but mostly the same things cerveso, sun, sand, and bird watching.

Onward for a three day stop in San Diego, where some of our sailors required emergency dental care, at the USN clinic,

for broken teeth, and root canals. San Diego is a clean and pretty city. Good meals were had in the touristy wharf area of the city. Next stop — San Francisco for three days. It is a marvelous city, — windy, beautiful sites, cable cars, golf, last minute shopping, excellent eating at the Fisherman's Wharf. We had a quick visit outside of the city to one of North America's largest flea market.

The last five days at sea were active with many preparations for customs, packing, firing exercises, rough water, however there was no sea sickness! In all it was a once in a lifetime experience. Dental Hygiene on the high seas is possible once you become familiar with the environment, the Navy needs it, and I highly recommend it.

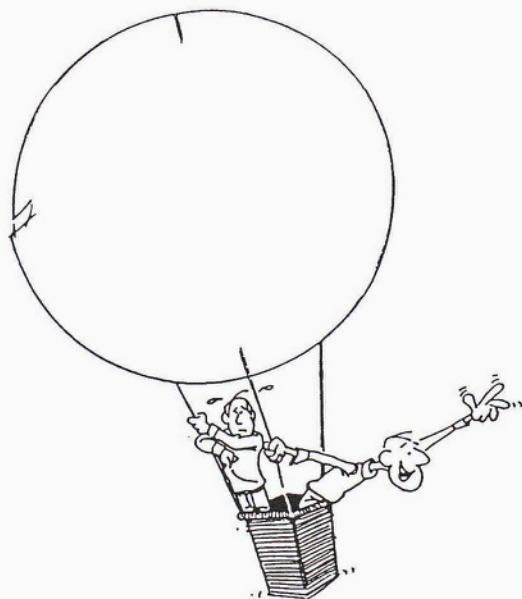
Le trophée a été présenté au major L.W. Bailey, officier commandant du Cadre de la compagnie dentaire de campagne le 21 août 1989.

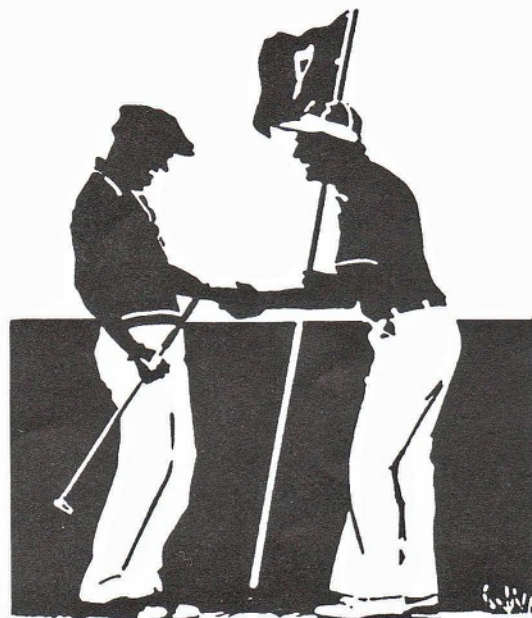

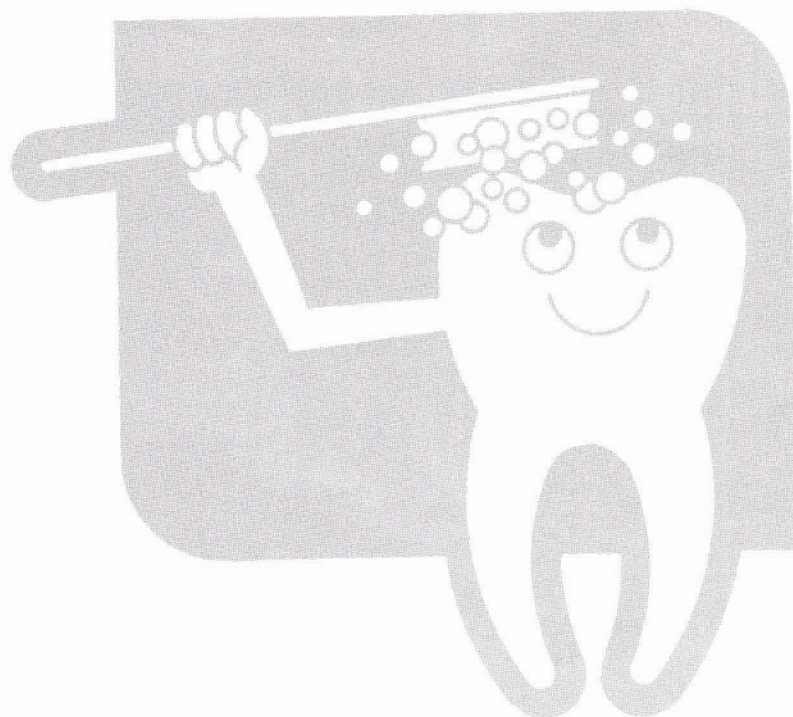

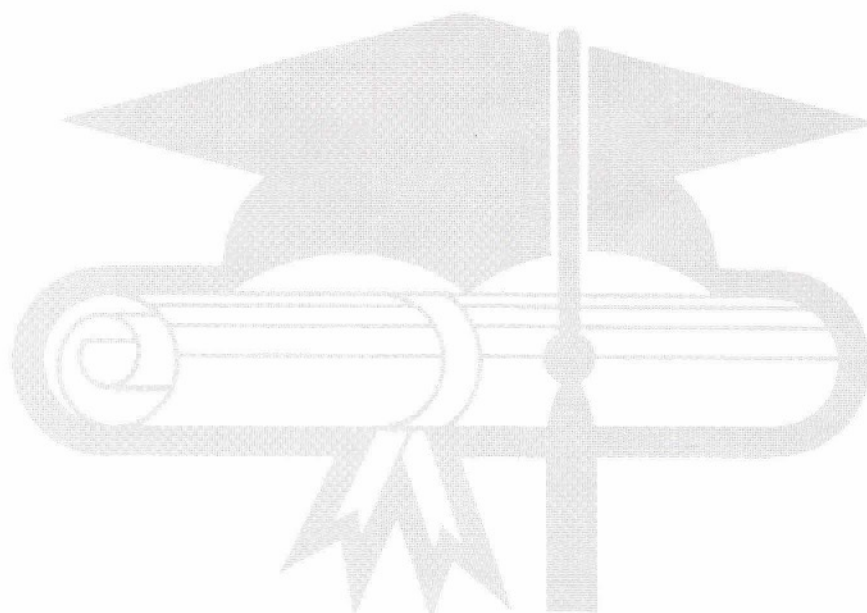
