75th Anniversary Logo

Canadian military dentistry was first organized on 20 April 1915. This logo commemorating the 75th anniversary of military dentistry in Canada is a composite of military badges. On the left is the badge of the Canadian Army Dental Corps (CADC) worn during WW I. Next, is a second badge of the CADC worn pre- and during WW II. The third badge was worn by the Royal Canadian Dental Corps from 1947 until unification of Canada's Armed Forces in 1968. The final badge is the current badge of the Canadian Forces Dental Services (CFDS), in which the greek symbol delta signifies dentistry, the rod of Aesculapius and the crusader sword signify the healing art and the military aspects of the Dental Services. The green colour is the military colour for dentistry.

A special 75th anniversary medal was produced by 35 Dental Unit Lahr and was available to all those who participated in one of the volksmarches in Canada or overseas.

La médecine dentaire canadienne fut organisée le 20 avril 1915. Ce logo commémorant le 75° anniversaire de la médecine dentaire militaire au Canada est un composite d'écussons militaires. Dans la partie supérieure, on retrouve l'écusson porté par les membres du Corps dentaire de l'Armée canadienne (CDAC) au cours de la première guerre mondiale. Ensuite, se retrouve la deuxième écusson porté par le CDAC avant et pendant la deuxième guerre mondiale. Le troisième écusson a été porté par les membres du Corps dentaire royal canadien de 1947 jusqu'à l'unification des forces armées canadiennes en 1968. La partie inférieure du logo est occupée par l'écusson actuel du Service dentaire des Forces canadiennes (SDFC) où la lettre majuscule grecque delta représente la médecine dentaire, la baguette d'Esculope ainsi que l'épée du croisé représentant respectivement l'art de la guérison et l'aspect militaire du Service dentaire. Le vert est la couleur militaire de la médecine dentaire.

This special issue of the Canadian Forces Dental Services Newsletter describes and illustrates in an entertaining way the joyous 75th anniversary encounters and celebrations conducted at national, unit and detachment levels, bringing together civilian employees, and serving and former members.

Celebrating 75 years of a uniformed dental service is a major occasion and undertaking. The intent throughout the CFDS in 1990 was to have as many serving and former members and civilians as possible participate in various unit and national events scheduled throughout the year. This was the mission assigned to a special committee established to plan the multifaceted celebrations held during 1990. Indeed, 1990 will in itself now become part of our history, and what an important historical year it turned out to be.

The April time frame was devoted to unit commemorations which included Volksmarches, bicycle tours, visits to Canadian military cemeteries, formal and informal mess dinners and dinings-in. in all regions of Canada and overseas.

The national focus of the Anniversary Year was held in Ottawa in conjunction with the Canadian Dental Association National Convention in late August. A Meet and Greet was held in the West Block of Parliament Hill on Sunday afternoon the 26 of August. What an exciting moment that was, as the uniformed military dental community met so many of its distinguished former members who wrote the glorious pages of a wonderful history. Over 520 husbands, wives, officers, NCMs, civilian members and friends of CFDS/RCDC turned out on a warm Sunday afternoon to greet each other in a manner and in atmosphere beyond the expectations of the organizers.

The principle event of the afternoon was the introduction and sale of the recently completed history of the RCDC/CFDS covering the period 1946 to 1986. Fortunately, its author, Col Harry Protheroe ret'd), was on hand to personally autograph this exciting and anectodal description of the many individuals who graced the pages of our history, and of the principle events which covered the 40 year period. Along with the sale of the history book, a nostalgic photo display depicting the 75 year history was viewed

Cette publication spéciale du Bulletin des Nouvelles du Service dentaire des Forces canadiennes décrit et illustre d'une manière divertissante les joyeuses rencontres et célébrations entourant le 75' anniversaire. Celles-ci furent tenues sur une échelle nationale ainsi qu'au niveau des unités et des détachements et permirent le rassemblement des employés civils avec les anciens membres et ceux qui sont présentement actifs.

L'organisation des festivités pour marquer le 75° anniversaire d'un service dentaire en uniforme est une tâche de grande envergure. Le but premier du SDFC, en 1990, était de permettre la participation du plus grand nombre possible d'anciens membres, de membres actifs, et de civils, aux différentes manifestations cédulées à l'échelle nationale et au niveau des unités au cours de l'année. Cette mission fut confiée à un comité spécial formé pour planifier les activités organisées en 1990. En fait, l'année 1990 fera partie de notre histoire et quelle année fut-elle!

Au cours du mois d'avril, les unités ont consacré leurs efforts pour commémorer cette occasion en organisant, dans toutes les régions du pays et outre-mer, des marches populaires, des randonnées en bicyclette, des visites aux cimetières militaires canadiens, des diners régimentaires officiels et officieux ainsi que des diners à participation mixte.

Le point de mire national de cette année de célébrations était à Ottawa, à la fin d'août, et coïncidait avec la tenue du Congrès de l'Association dentaire canadienne. Un après-midi d'accueil a eu lieu le dimanche 26 août dans l'Édifice ouest, sur la colline parlementaire. Et comment décrire ce moment mouvementé lorsque la communauté dentaire militaire en uniforme rencontra autant d'anciens membres distingués qui représentaient tant de pages glorieuses d'une histoire si merveilleuse. Plus de 520 époux et épouses, officiers et membres du rang ainsi que membres civils et amis du SDFC/CDRC se présentèrent un beau dimanche aprèsmidi pour se rencontrer d'une façon et dans une atmosphère qui dépassèrent toutes les espérances du comité organisateur.

Le fait saillant de cet après-midi fut la présentation et la mise en vente du livre d'histoire du CDRC/SDFC récemment achevé couvrant la période de 1946 à 1986. Heureusement, son auteur, le col (à la retraite) Harry Protheroe, était sur place pour mettre son autographe à cette œuvre remplie de descriptions excitantes et souvent anecdotiques des nombreux individus responsables de notre histoire ainsi que des principaux événements qui caractérisèrent cette période. En plus de la mise en vente de ce livre d'histoire, les participants ont pu examiner un photo-montage à caractère nostalgique dépeignant cette histoire couvrant une période de 75 ans. Tous ceux qui y assistèrent se sont vus présenter l'épingle du CDRC/SDFC conçue et offerte gratuitement par l'Association du CDRC. Certains membres du personnel de l'ESDFC étaient sur place avec un étalage d'accessoires d'habillement pour le personnel du SDFC.

Parmi les participants, il faut souligner la présence de 73 individus qui faisaient partie du CDRC pendant la deuxième guerre mondiale. Quel grand plaisir à rencontrer autant d'anciens membres et à écouter leurs réminiscences du Service dentaire pendant cette période si difficile. All attendees received the RCDC/CFDS lapel pin created and donated by the RCDC Association. Members of CFDSS were on hand with a display of available CFDS accountrements.

Included in the afternoon attendance were 73 individuals who had experience with the Canadian Dental Corps during World War II. What a delight it was meeting with so many former members and listening to their reminiscences of the Dental Services during that difficult period. Many long standing friendships were renewed, long lost comrades reunited, and many war stories told during this moving afternoon which was an eye opener and an education for the younger generation of CFDS members.

The following evening, Monday the 27 of August, an experience was shared by over 480 people which will be long remembered as one of the premier events in our history year. An all ranks and civilian mixed dining-in was enjoyed by all at the Skyline Hotel. Following an animated reception, attendees were ushered to their pre-selected seats while awaiting the entrance of the official head table party.

Following an outstanding meal which culminated with the special commemorative cakes with sparklers illuminating the darkened room, it was generally agreed that the dinner set the tone for a memorable evening. The PMC for the night, LCol Gilles Brissette, offered the appropriate toasts, and introduced the head table. This included the special guest, LGen Fox, ADM(Per), all former Directors General and wives, representatives from serving and former NCMs in the persons of CWO Roy Matheson and CWO Bob Gayler and wives, the outgoing and incoming Colonel Commandants as well as a representative of the civilian members of CFDS, Mrs. Isabel Prieur and her husband John. General Thompson used the occasion to give a final salute following 40 years of service to dentistry, using his original Air Force wedgie from 1942. Charlie Hunt spoke on behalf of the RCDC Association and former members in a moving address commemorating this momentous occasion. LGen Fox was very generous in his accolades and congratulatory words which underlined the significant contribution of an effective organization in both peace and war. He recognized the high level of dental fitness and the

Les membres du rang, anciens et actifs, furent représentés par les adjc Roy Matheson et Bob Gayler accompagnés de leur épouse. standard of dental care provided to all members of the Forces over the years. Mention was made of the caliber of CFDS personnel, the excellent training programs and of a unique and well known esprit de corps and sense of dedication.

The Director General Dental Services, BGen J.F. Begin, recognized a number of people at the head table and in the audience. He also used the occasion to make a few important announcements. The first was a farewell and an expression of gratitude to the outgoing Colonel Commandant, BGen Bill Thompson, for his many years of devotion to the Dental Services and in particular for the last five years as the Dental Branch Colonel Commandant. General Begin then welcomed the newly appointed Colonel Commandant, Colonel John Brick, and announced at the same time that he had been awarded an appointment of Queen's Honorary Dental Surgeon. DGDS acknowledged the presence of all former Directors General who were greeted with a standing ovation in appreciation for their many years of strong leadership. Included were Brigadier Generals Baird, Kearney, Evans, Thompson and Wright, and their wives.

General Begin then recognized those who served during the Second World War, and in Korea. All commanding officers and commandants who served during the past 40 years were given special recognition as were all serving and former chief warrant officers, representing the NCMs. A special mention was made of serving and former civilian employees of the Dental Services.

Another highlight of the DGDS' talk was the mention of the members of the organizing committee who had worked diligently over a long period to make this weekend such a success. In particular, General Begin thanked Col David Jones, the Chairman; Major Tom Mountain, the Secretary and main implementor of the major decisions; Major Julia Sloane, the individual responsible for the publication of the History; Capt Terry Mayne, the individual who prepared the photo montage for the Meet and Greet; the representatives from the serving and former NCMs, CWO Bob Gayler and former MWO Earl McFadden and Sgt René Tremblay; Mrs. Bonnie Lecompte, the civilian member of the Committee; and finally the Colonel Commandant, General Thompson and the President of the RCDC Association, LCol Charlie Hunt.

Charlie Hunt entered the Ballroom early in the evening as a Major, and departed much later as a Lieutenant Colonel. This is due to the important announcement that the Minister of National Defence, on the recommendation of ADM(Per) and the Chief of the Defence Staff, had approved the appointment of Charlie Hunt as the first honorary LCol of the Dental Reserves, an honour







Deployment of 5 CMB Dental Platoon (Oka, Quebec)

On 20 August 1990, the dental platoon of 5 Canadian Mechanized Brigade was deployed in response to an FMC tasking for the provision of dental treatment services to brigade troops involved in internal security operations in the vicinities of Oka and Châteauguay, Québec. Four treatment sections were deployed to field units, namely: 2 R22eR, 3 R22eR, 2 RCR and 5 Service Battalion. The dental platoons original treatment mission as directed by FMCHQ was for the provision of emergency dental care in the field. As the operational time frame expanded, the treatment mission progressed into a completion of unit Phase One's and then into routine treatment. A heliborne casualty evacuation system was in place in co-operation with 5 Field Ambulance for access to oral surgical services in urban Montréal. Despite challenging climatic and geographical conditions, the morale and professionalism of the platoon remained at its usual high level and field units expressed nothing but complete satisfaction with their dental treatment services.

Le 20 août 1990, le peloton dentaire de la 5º Brigade mécanisée du Canada a été déployé à l'appel d'un devoir de la FMC pour fournir des soins dentaires aux troupes de la brigade impliquées dans les opérations de sécurité interne aux alentours d'Oka et de Châteauguay, Qué. Quatre sections de traitement ont été déployées avec les unités à savoir le 2e R22eR, le 3e R22eR, le 2 RCR et le 5º Bataillon des Services du Canada. D'abord, le but premier du peloton dentaire, selon les instructions de la FMC était de fournir les soins d'urgence dans le champ. A mesure que la periode de déploiement s'allongeait, le traitement engloba l'achèvement des Phases Un des unités et ensuite, les soins de routine. Un système d'évacuation des blessés par hélicoptère était en place par l'entremise de la 5° Ambulance de campagne pour avoir accès aux services des chirurgiens buccaux de Montréal. Malgré les défis climatiques et géographiques, le moral et le professionalisme du peloton dentaire ont toujours demeuré à un haut niveau et les unités de champ n'ont exprimé qu'une satisfaction complète suite aux traitements dentaires qu'elles ont reçues.

United States Hospital Ship USNS Mercy

On 2 August 1990, Iraqi military forces invaded Kuwait, and positioned themselves favorably for a possible attack on Saudi Arabia. The Canadian government decided to send three naval vessels to support UN sanctions against Iraq.

The initial Canadian military commitment to the coalition forces was also accompanied by medical/dental support. A nine member Canadian Surgical Augmentation Team was sent to the Persian Gulf on 28 September 1990 to join the crew of the USNS MERCY. These nine members were the first Canadians to enter the gulf.

The Canadian Forces Dental Services personnel assigned to the team included: Maj Paul Demers, oral and maxillofacial surgeon, 12 Dental Detachment Halifax; and Cpl Kimberly Smallman, dental clinical assistant, Canadian Forces Dental Services School Borden.

USNS MERCY

USNS MERCY, 10 stories high and 894 feet long, is the largest trauma facility in the world. She is the third largest ship in the US Navy, after aircraft carriers and helicopter carriers. The primary mission of the USNS MERCY, and her sister ship the USNS COMFORT, is to provide acute medical and surgical care in support of Rapid Deployment forces, US Marine Amphibious Task Forces, and forward Deployed Naval Fleet activities located in hostile areas.

The MERCY's wide range of services makes it comparable to a big city university medical center. Patient care facilities include twelve operating rooms and patient care wards totalling 1,000 beds. This includes four intensive care wards with 90 beds.

The Dental Department

The Dental Department provides routine and emergency dental care for patients and staff personnel relative to the diagnosis, treatment, and management of diseases, injuries, and disorders of the teeth, jaws, and associated structures. In addition, the Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Division provides all major and minor oral surgery and dentofacial orthopedic services including fractures involving the mandible, maxilla, and zygomatico-maxillary complex. The departmental establishment included three oral and maxillofacial surgeons, two general dentists, and 12 dental technicians (inclusive of dental clinical assistants, laboratory technician, dental equipment repair technician, dental hygienist).

The dental department has state of the art facilities, that consist of four dental operatories, two oral surgery operating rooms and a complete prosthetic laboratory. 1,521 patients from all branches of military service, including both Canadian and British personnel were treated through to the end of December 1990.

The Canadian Surgical Augmentation Team was completely integrated with the crew of the Medical Treatment Facility. My first view of the MERCY was through the helicopter window as we approached the ship. I remember seeing a mammoth white vessel with the Canadian flag prominently displayed. I believe this was a symbol of the very warm welcome we were to receive. We were quickly orientated and then assigned to our respective departments.

The American crew consistently went out of their way to make us feel welcome. For example, the traditional Canadian Thanks-giving Day was celebrated. To mark the occasion, the galley served traditional fare from the great white north. The dinner began with iced, boiled beaver tail accompanied with a fresh maple leaf salad (served with syrup); the entree was stir-fried caribou tripe cooled to room temperature or baked seal blubber; dessert was the usual Canadian delight (ice and plenty of it).

We received instruction in useful Arabic phrases, to aid us when travelling in moslem areas. This was to prepare us for our liberty port visits. For example:

AKBAR CHALI-KILI HAFTIR LOFTAN

which means:

"Thank you for showing me your marvellous gun"

AUTO ARRAREGH DAVATEMAN MANO SEPAHEH-HAST which means:

"It is exceptionally kind of you to allow me to travel in the trunk of your car."

I did not have to use any of these handy phrases at our liberty port visits. I found the Arabs to be kind and gracious hosts.

The rotation of the Canadian Surgical Augmentation Team occurred in mid-January just prior to the outbreak of hostilities Maj Demers and Cpl Smallman were replaced by Maj Chagno and Cpl Giroux from 15 Dental Detachment Valcartier.

Yellow Ribbon Ceremony

LCol Budzinski CO of 1 Dental Unit, Maj Cousens Detachment Commander and Cpl Michelle Allen represented the CFDS at this special ceremony on 18 September 1990. The yellow ribbon ceremony was held in honour of the hospital staff which included Major Paul Demers, Oral Surgeon from Halifax and his assistant Corporal Kim Smallman from Borden, who were deployed on Op Friction/Desert Shield to the Persian Gulf on board the "USNS MERCY" Hospital Ship. The Commandant NDMC and staff members gathered outside the hospital for the ceremony during which

the Padres lead in prayer and gave their blessing. After the introduction by BGen Clay, the hospital commandant, the ribbons were tied to the tree, one for each member. The yellow ribbon signifies someone we care for is in an extremely difficult situation, outside the normal difficulties of life.

Preparing for the Persian Gulf

The Persian Gulf crisis resulted in extensive behind-the-scenes activity on the dental net regarding the three participating ships PROTECTEUR, ATHABASKAN, TERRA NOVA and at CFB Halifax, CFB Shearwater and CFB Chatham:

- Capt Cupples, Dent Det Comd PROTECTEUR recalled from leave in Toronto.
- Sgt Simpson, Greenwood Detachment, who was originally scheduled to replace Sgt Lee-Grant aboard PROTECTEUR for a NATO deployment to European ports, ended up with an itinerary change – Persian Gulf!
- Considerable after-hours work was involved in duplicating approximately 1,300 charts for forensic purposes (this number caused by repeated changes in names of personnel being tasked).
- Chart duplication was also conducted by Chatham and Shearwater Detachments as personnel from those locations were also being deployed to the Persian Gulf.

Underway to the Persian Gulf

- Following the Gibraltar port visit, played war games for two days with no time for dentistry.
- On the way to the Suez Canal stopped for a two day port visit in Augusta, Sicily. Augusta is a small town, only two restaurants and as soon as Canadian landed ashore the price of everything seemed to triple!
- Set sail again and in three days were anchored off Port Said awaiting passage through the Suez Canal.
- Passed through the Suez Canal and into the Red Sea and in about four days arrived in Dibouti. Only had one night ashore and it was really an eye opener, people sleeping in the gutters and begging in the street.
- Set sail again and on 28 September all three ships arrived at the forward operating base at Manamah, Bahrain. Manamah is a very old city but very westernized with English pubs, discos, etc.

- Maj Demers (who is stationed aboard USN Ship MERCY in Bahrain) visited the Detachment while PROTECTEUR was at anchor nearby during transit to the Persian Gulf. Cpl Smallman (Maj Demers' Dental Assistant) paid a visit to HMCS ATHABASKAN which was also alongside in the same area.
- The heat is extreme with day time highs of 40 degrees and night time lows of only 32 degrees. Summer tans are fading because it is just too hot to venture out on the decks for very long.
