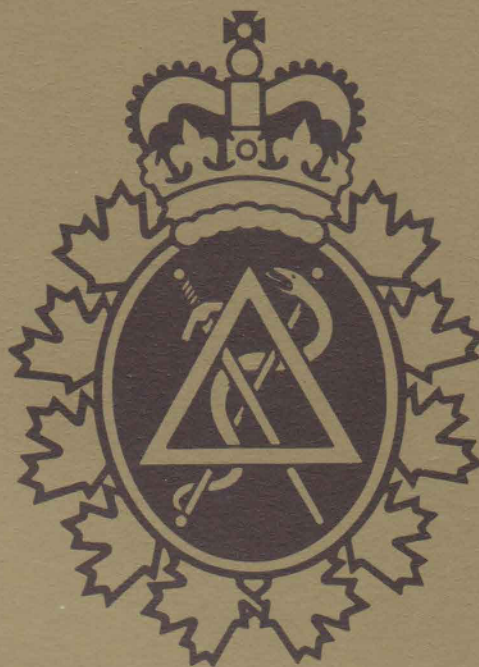

IN MEMORIAM



DR. G.R. COVEY 1919 - 1984

Colonel George Ross Covey, MBE, CD, QHDS, FICD, Colonel Commandant of the Canadian Forces Dental Services, passed away in Ottawa on Tuesday, 7 August, 1984. All members of the Canadian Forces Dental Services mourn his passing and extend their deepest sympathy to his wife and family. His leadership, dedication, and contributions both to military dentistry and to CFDS will be remembered by those who served with him in the Canadian Forces.

Colonel Covey was born in Toronto, Ontario on 26 March 1919 and graduated in 1941 from the Faculty of Dentistry, University of Toronto with the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery. Colonel Covey commenced his military career in 1941 and saw service with the Canadian Army during the Second World War. Immediately following the war, he transferred to the Regular Force and continued to serve until his retirement in 1973. His senior appointments included command of 25 Canadian Field Dental Unit in Korea, Commanding Officer of 35 Field Dental Unit, Metz, France, Commandant of the Royal Canadian Dental

Dental Corps School at Camp Borden and Deputy Director General of Dental Services at National Defence Headquarters.

After release from the Canadian Forces in September 1973, Colonel Covey was appointed Director of the Dental Health Science Program at Algonquin College in Ottawa. In 1974 he returned to private practice retiring in 1979. Colonel Covey's military and civilian awards and honours include his appointment as a Queen's Honourary Dental Surgeon; a Fellow in the International College of Dentists; a member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire and a life-time member of the Canadian Dental Association.

Colonel Covey continued his active support of the CFDS in the capacity of Vice-President of the RCDC Association and since 1 August, 1982, as the Colonel Commandant of the Canadian Forces Dental Services. Throughout his extensive military career and as Colonel Commandant, Colonel Covey represented the Canadian Forces and the Dental Services in an exemplary manner. His advice and counsel were most meaningful not only to those senior members of the CFDS but to all officers and other ranks of the CFDS.

Colonel Covey is survived by his wife Dorothy Yvonne Chester and his son Michael Ross Covey of Oakville, Ontario, and his daughter-in-law Fabienne Martine.

IN MEMORIAM

DR. G.R. COVEY 1919 - 1984

Le colonel George Ross Covey, MBE, CD, QHDS, FICD et colonel commandant du Service dentaire des Forces canadiennes est décédé, à Ottawa, le mardi 7 août 1984. Le personnel du Service dentaire des Forces canadiennes déplore sa disparition et offre ses plus sincères sympathies à son épouse et aux membres de sa famille. Ses qualités de chef, son dévouement et ses nombreuses contributions dans les sphères de la dentisterie militaire et au sein du SDPC resteront à jamais gravées dans la mémoire de ceux et celles qui ont oeuvré à ses côtés.

Le colonel Covey est né à Toronto (Ontario), le 26 mars 1919. En 1941, il termine son doctorat en chirurgie dentaire à la Faculté de médecine dentaire de l'Université de Toronto, puis s'enrôle dans l'Armée canadienne alors en guerre. Dès la fin des hostilités, il joint la Force régulière et en demeure membre jusqu'à sa retraite en 1973. Au cours de sa carrière, le colonel Covey a occupé entre autres les postes

supérieurs de commandant de la 25^e Unité dentaire de campagne en Corée, de la 35^e Unité dentaire de campagne à Metz, en France et de l'École du Corps dentaire royal canadien, au Camp Borden et de Directeur général adjoint du Service dentaire, au Quartier général.

Après sa libération des Forces canadiennes, en septembre 1973, le colonel Covey est nommé Directeur du Programme d'hygiène dentaire au Collège Algonquin, à Ottawa, puis s'occupe de son cabinet de dentiste, de 1974 à 1979. Le colonel est titulaire de nombreuses distinctions militaires et civiles, notamment celle de chirurgien dentiste honoraire de la reine, de membre du Collège international des dentistes et de l'Ordre de l'Empire britannique ainsi que membre à vie de l'Association dentaire canadienne.

Le colonel Covey a poursuivi ses activités au sein du SDFC en devenant vice-président de l'Association du CDRC, puis en assumant, le 1 août 1982, le rôle de colonel commandant du Service. Tout au long de sa carrière militaire et de son mandat de colonel commandant, le colonel Covey a su représenter sans faille les Forces canadiennes et le Service dentaire. Il a, par ses conseils et son aide, prêté main-forte tant aux membres de la direction, qu'aux officiers et personnel non officier du SDFC.

Le colonel Covey laisse dans le deuil son épouse Dorothy Yvonne Chester, son fils Michael Ross Covey et sa belle-fille Fabienne Martine, résidents d'Oakville (Ontario).

CFDS History

DGDS ACTIVITIES

At the last Federation Dentaire Internationale (FDI) Conference held in Helsinki, Finland, in August 1984, the Director General Dental Services, BGen J.N. Wright, was elected to the Executive Council of the Defence Forces Dental Services Commission of the FDI. During this conference BGen Wright was also appointed to chair a major symposium on the dental equipment requirements for rural and field conditions. It is anticipated that this will be a ½-day symposium in a 3-day program at the next FDI Conference to be held in Belgrade, Yugoslavia in 1985. This symposium will focus on the provision of dental services in 3rd World Countries and in field conditions by the military.

In addition to the above, BGen Wright was elected during a recent CDA Board of Governors meeting held in Ottawa on 21 September, 1984, to the Executive Council of the Canadian Dental Association. In this new appointment BGen Wright will be representing all dentists in Ontario; both civilian and military.

On 20 September, 1984, BGen Wright chaired the Committee on Salaried Dentists for the Canadian Dental Association. From 24 September to 5 October, 1984 he chaired Merit Board #11 responsible for all promotions Captain to Major, Major to Lieutenant-Colonel for all specialist officer classifications except medical. Col H.W. Brogan, CO 12 Dental Unit, also sat on this Board as a member.

ACTIVITES DU DGSD

Depuis la récente conférence de la Fédération dentaire internationale (FDI) tenue à Helsinki, en Finlande, le Directeur général du Service dentaire, le bgén J.N. Wright siège au conseil exécutif de la Commission permanente pour les services dentaires des forces armées. Le bgén Wright a de plus, à cette occasion, présidé un important symposium sur le matériel dentaire nécessaire en campagne et dans les milieux ruraux. Du 24 septembre au 5 octobre, il a présidé le conseil de promotion au mérite no. 11 chargé d'étudier les candidatures à la promotion aux grades de major et de lieutenant-colonel des spécialistes de toutes les classifications, sauf médicale. Le col H.W. Brogan, de la 12^e Unité dentaire, était également membre du conseil.

GENERAL NEWS

On 28-29 May 84, DDTS conducted a seminar to determine the support required and available to CFDS to effect the introduction of the revised Canadian Forces Dental Care Program. DGDS staff members and three clinical psychologists were in attendance. It was felt that workshops conducted by clinical psychologists for the field would be of benefit to CFDS personnel in order that they acquire a fundamental understanding of patient behaviour modification.

On 4 Jun 84, Col Begin presented a review of the organization and the functions of Dental Services in the field to an ADM(Per) sponsored Base and Station Commanders' seminar. On 15 Jun 84 he attended a House of Delegates meeting of the association of Canadian Faculties of Dentistry in Winnipeg. On 16 Jul 84, Col Begin chaired a seminar on Dental Standards for enrolment in the Canadian Forces. A re-definition of the standards, along with a directive on the application of these standards, will be forthcoming. It is hoped that the results of this seminar will go a long way on reducing the problems associated with dental enrolment standards which have occurred over the last few years.

On 20 Jun 84 a Post-Graduate Selection Board was held at the Dental Services Division. The Board recommended a number of candidates for specialty training beginning in 1985 based on an established merit list. At this time a response from the United States Army Dental Corps is required to determine which vacancies in each specialty discipline will be available.

LCol P.R. McQueen, DDPR, visited 12 Dental Unit, CFB Halifax in July to view the progress in construction at the new hospital. To date the project is on schedule and looking good.

SOCIAL EVENTS

An enjoyable social evening was held on 8 Jun to bid farewell to LCol and Mrs. Y. Ayotte; LCol G. Boulanger, PCO 8; and Capt J. Patterson. LCol Ayotte is replacing LCol J. Lemieux as B Dent O St Jean; LCol Boulanger is departing NDHQ for his new assignment as BDentO Valcartier; and Capt Patterson left for CFDSS to take up a new position as Standards Officer for CFDSS. Once again to all of you, all the best in your future assignments from those of us at the Dental Services Division.

AUTRES NOUVELLES

Les 28 et 29 mai 1984, le DSD Soins a dirigé une rencontre ayant pour but de déterminer les ressources en soutien nécessaires et disponibles au SDFC pour la mise en oeuvre du nouveau Programme de soins dentaires des Forces canadiennes. Le personnel du DGSD ainsi que trois psychologues cliniciens y participaient également. Il semble que le personnel du SDFC pourrait bénéficier d'ateliers que dirigeraient les psychologues et grâce auxquels il comprendrait mieux les changements d'attitude des patients face à la santé dentaire.

Le 4 juin 1984, le col Begin a présenté un exposé sur l'organisation et les fonctions du Service dentaire aux commandants des bases et des stations réunis dans le cadre d'un colloque parainné par le SMA(Per). Le 15 du même mois, il assistait, à Winnipeg, à la réunion des délégués de l'association des facultés de médecine dentaire du Canada. Il présidait, le lendemain, un colloque sur les normes de santé dentaire à l'enrôlement applicables aux Forces canadiennes. Les autorités se pencheront bientôt sur la redéfinition de ces normes et émettront une directive sur leur application. Les organisateurs espèrent que les résultats du colloque permettront d'amoindrir les problèmes que l'application de ces normes ont entraîné au cours des dernières années.

Un jury de sélection s'est réuni le 20 juin dernier, dans les locaux de la Division du Service dentaire, afin de recommander à la spécialisation, pour 1985, la candidature de certains officiers basée sur le mérite. Le service dentaire de l'Armée américaine doit encore préciser le nombre de places disponibles dans les différents programmes de spécialisation.

Le lcol P.R. McQueen, DSDPB, s'est rendu à la 12^e Unité dentaire, à la BFC Halifax, au mois de juillet et a pu constater l'avancement des travaux de construction du nouvel hôpital. L'échéancier est respecté et le projet va bon train.

FIELD DENTAL DOCTRINE by DDPR-4, LCol (Ret'd) M. Pillar

The first draft of CFP 312(12) - Dental Support in an Area of Operations has been completed. It has been staffed throughout the Dental Services Division and has recently been passed to unit COs for comments. Once the draft has been approved within the "dental family" it will be forwarded to Headquarters, Mobile Command for general staffing. Hopefully, the final edition will be available for use by the spring of 1985.

CFP 312(12) is the first publication of its kind and a considerable amount of research and thought has gone into its preparation. Hopefully, it will serve as a useful basis for the conduct of field dental training at CFDSS and at the unit level and as a source document for the preparation of standing operating procedures, etc.

While CFP 312(12) will have application throughout the Canadian Forces, it is intended primarily for the CFDS. With this in mind, a certain amount of essential background information concerning the land force has been included in the manual. Hopefully, this will add to the completeness of the publication while, at the same time, saving the dental reader from having to search through a number of other CFPs in order to obtain the required information.

DEFENCE PLANS

DDPR-4 is now in the process of preparing a second draft of HQ DP 117 - Canadian Forces Emergency Dental Support Plan. It will be remembered that the first draft was produced late last year and in some haste in order to be available for testing during Exercise BOLD STEP 84 (a CF - wide mobilization exercise conducted in February of this year). The second draft will not be able to address, in a definitive manner, all of the dental support arrangements for the war or emergency situation. This is mainly because the Dental Services Division does not possess all of the necessary information concerning NDHQ and functional command emergency plans. In other words, we cannot produce a final dental plan until we know precisely what has to be supported. This means that it will be necessary to produce a third draft and then an interim plan. The objective is to have the interim plan in place in time for use during the next major mobilization exercise (tentatively planned for the early winter of 1986.)

The principal objective of the second draft will be to document, while they are still fresh in the minds of the players, the lessons learned during BOLD STEP 84. Units will be asked to comment on the second draft.

MEDECINE DENTAIRE EN CAMPAGNE
par le lcol M. Pillar (retraité) - DSDPB-4

On a maintenant terminé la rédaction de la première ébauche de la PFC 312(12) intitulée Dental Support in an Area of Operations. Le document a été transmis au personnel de la Division du Service dentaire et, plus récemment, aux commandants d'unités dont nous attendons maintenant les observations. Une fois approuvée par l'ensemble du Service dentaire, la PFC sera acheminée au quartier général de la Force mobile aux fins d'étude générale. Les autorités espèrent en publier la version finale d'ici au printemps 1985.

C'est la première fois qu'un document du genre est publié. La PFC 312(12) a exigé beaucoup de recherche et de travail. Les autorités espèrent qu'elle sera utile dans le cadre du programme de formation (exercice en campagne) offert à l'ESDFC et dans les différentes unités et pourra servir en vue de la rédaction d'instructions permanentes d'opérations, etc.

Bien que l'application de la PFC 312(12) intéressera l'ensemble des Forces canadiennes, le document s'adresse surtout au SDFC et c'est pourquoi l'ouvrage comprend des renseignements généraux essentiels sur les forces terrestres. En procédant ainsi, le lecteur n'aura pas à consulter d'autres PFC pour obtenir les renseignements nécessaires.

PLANS DE DÉFENSE

Le DSDPB-4 prépare, à l'heure actuelle, la deuxième ébauche du HQ DP 117 intitulé Canadian Forces Emergency Dental Support Plan (Plan de soutien dentaire d'urgence des Forces canadiennes). La version originale a été préparée plutôt rapidement à la fin de l'an dernier et mise à l'essai dans le cadre de l'exercice BOLD STEP 84 (exercice des Forces canadiennes mené en février). Dans cette nouvelle version, il sera impossible d'examiner en détail tous les aspects du soutien dentaire en cas de guerre ou de crise nationale. La Division du Service dentaire ne dispose pas des renseignements nécessaires relativement aux plans d'urgence du QGDN et des commandements fonctionnels. En d'autres termes, nous ne pouvons dresser un plan de soutien dentaire définitif avant de savoir exactement ce qu'il nous faut appuyer. Une troisième version sera donc nécessaire après quoi l'on pourra établir un plan provisoire. Les autorités espèrent avoir élaboré un plan de ce genre à temps pour être mis à l'essai au cours du prochain grand exercice de mobilisation (prévu jusqu'à nouvel ordre pour le début de l'hiver 1986.)

Dans la deuxième version, les auteurs essaieront d'analyser, pendant que l'expérience est encore fraîche dans leur mémoire, les leçons à tirer de l'exercice BOLD STEP 84. Les unités devront par ailleurs formuler des observations sur cette nouvelle ébauche.

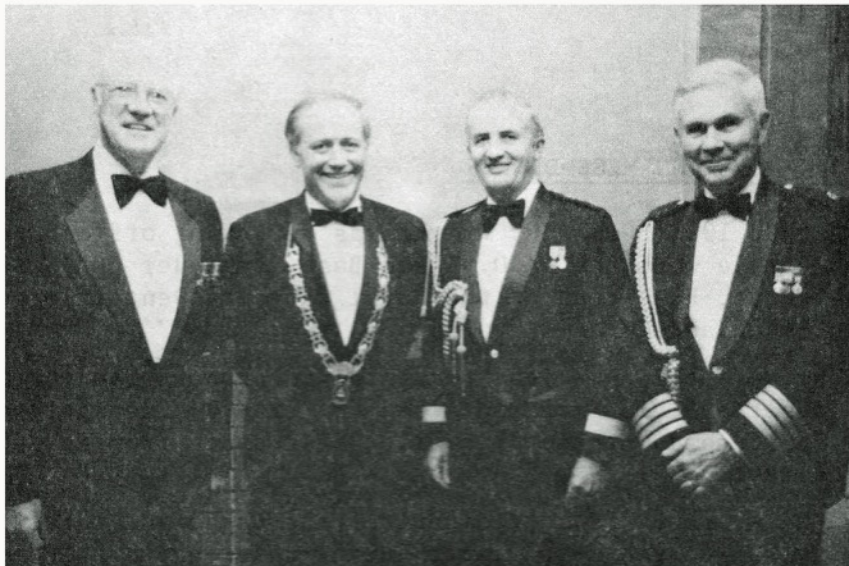
GRADUATION DES CANDIDATS AU PFDM ET DÎNER RÉGIMENTAIRE

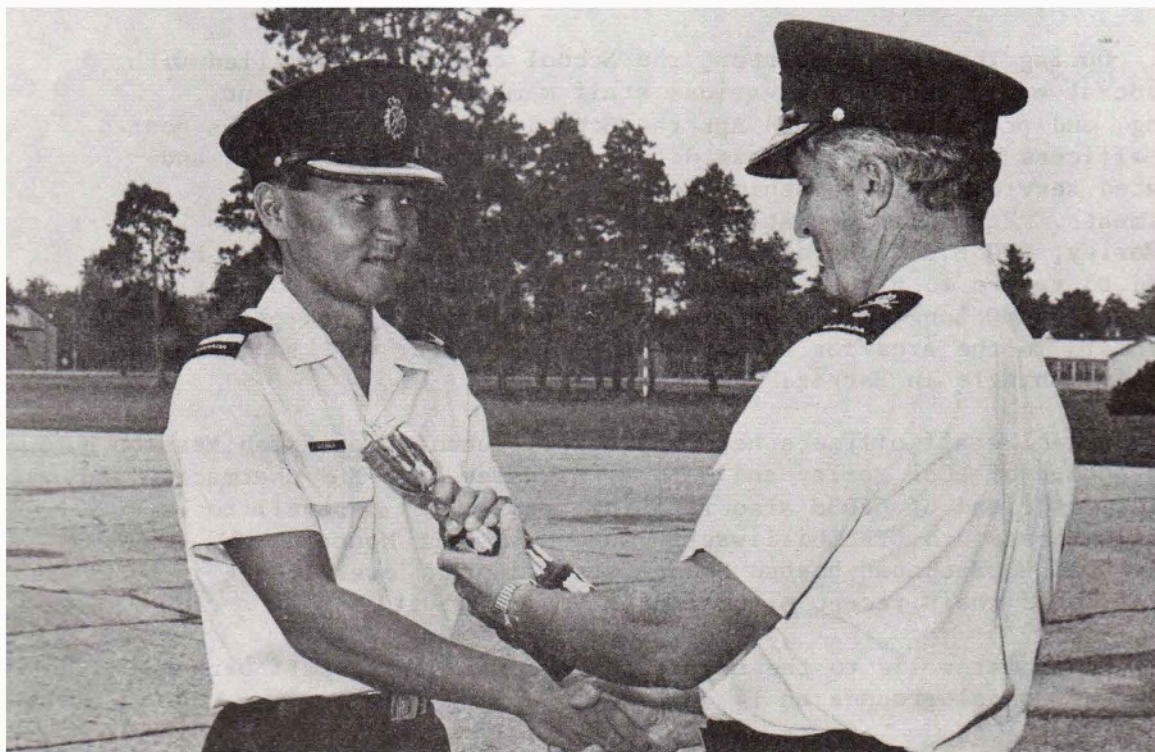

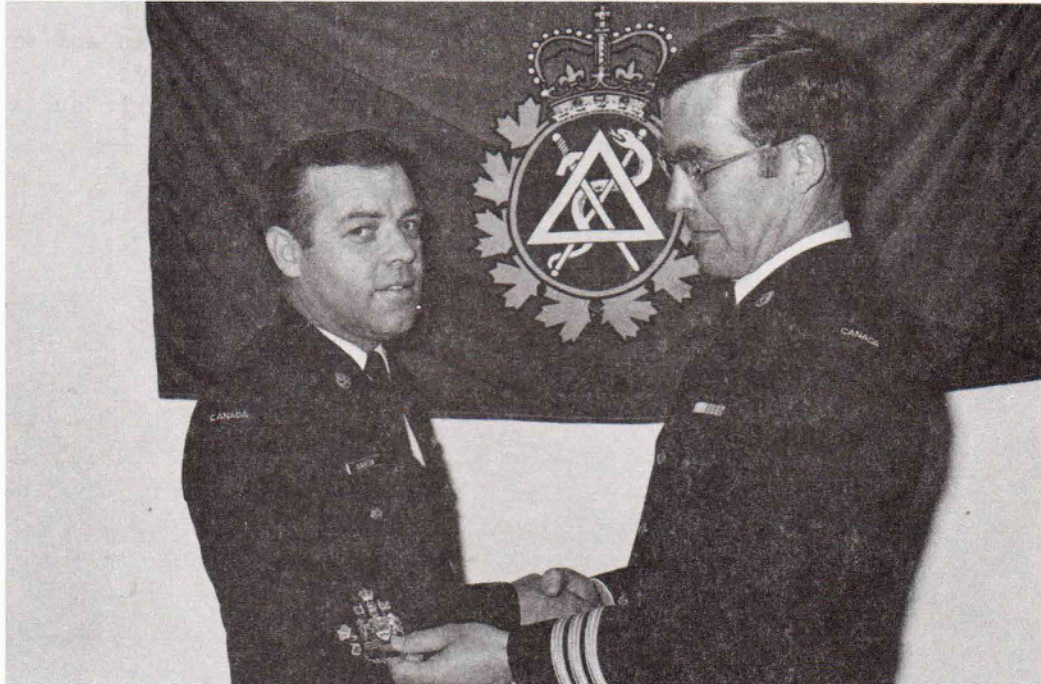

- Born at 96 Parliament Square, Fredericton, Oct 15, 1898. Youngest of three girls and two boys of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Wesley Edgecombe.
- Attended Fredericton Elementary and Fredericton High School graduating in Jun 1916.

- Enrolled in Sep 1919 in Royal College of Dental Surgeons, Toronto. Graduated May 1923 with Degree LDS and from University of Toronto the degree DDS.
- Practiced May 1923 until early 1924 in Stellerton, N.S. employed by Dr. Weldon Fraser and Dr. McNutt, both of New Glasgow.
- Moved to Saint John, N.B. in May 1924. Elected to be President of Saint John Dental Society in 1926. Elected to be President of the New Brunswick Dental Society in 1929 and again in 1930. Elected to Board of Governors of Canadian Dental Association 1960-68. Elected again to be President of Saint John Dental Society 1968. Voted Honorary President of New Brunswick Dental Society 1970.
- In July 1980 at the Canadian Dental Society annual meeting in Halifax made an Honorary Life Member and presented with a bronze plaque.
- Took an Army signalling course with the 71st Regiment and received certificate Grade B in Fredericton winter of 1913 and 1914. Joined the 71st Regiment (York Regiment) and went to Camp Sussex for two weeks July 1914 with this York Regiment. Joined the 9th Siege Battery (Canadian Garrison Artillery) on (Partridge Island, Saint John, Sep 1916.
- Drafted overseas to England, March 1917. Posted to France as reinforcements to Headquarters 8th Army Field Brigade (Canadian Field Artillery) Sep 1917. Then posted, same month to 43rd Battery (now Guelph) Ontario to a 4.5 Howitzer Battery, Canadian Field Artillery. Served duration of war as a limber gunner with that unit. Discharged in Fredericton 1919.
- Joined 3rd Regiment Artillery (Loyal Company of Artillery) in Saint John, 1926.
- Qualified as a Lieutenant, Artillery, in summer at Petawawa, Ontario 1927.
- Took Militia Staff course as Major and passed at Connaught Ranges, Ottawa in 1936. Qualified in 1938 as Major in coast defense artillery and was 2IC of 3rd Coast Regiment when World War II broke out Sep 1939.
- Transferred to Canadian Dental Corps in Nov 1939 and appointed District Dental Officer, Military District No. 7 (New Brunswick), and O.C. No. 7 Coy - C.D.C.

- Appointed to Command No. 3 Dental Company, 3rd Canadian overseas Division Jun 1940 and spent winter 1940-41 in Debert, N.S.
- Took No. 3 Company overseas in Jun 1941 with rank of LCol. Unit changed to Army Dental Troops, July 1941. Appointed Assistant Director of Dental Services in May 1942 with rank of Colonel at 1st Canadian Army Headquarters. Appointed to A.D.D.S. at 1st Canadian Corps, Italy, in Oct 1943.
- Returned to U.K. in April 1944 to again take over as A.D.D.S. 1st Canadian Army. Received Order of British Empire from King George VI at Buckingham Palace. Proceeded to France with Canadian Army July 1944 until peace signed May 1945.
- Appointed Deputy Director of Dental Services at Canadian Military Headquarters in London, July 1945. Returned to Canada, Dec 1945. Discharged April 1946 to civilian life.
- In 1947 on Army re-organization was appointed A.D.D.S. with rank of Colonel to Eastern Command with Dental Companies 50-51 in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

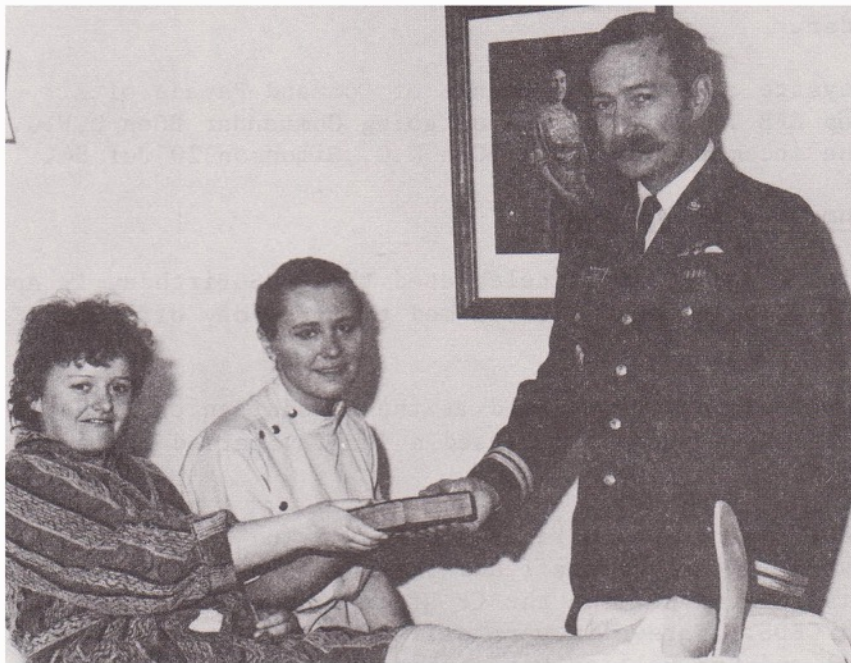
A very informative and enjoyable tour of Corby Distilleries in Corbyville was held on 1 Jun 84 for clinic staff.

Unit records indicate that 14 Dental Company RCDC was formed on the 28th Jun 1950 and comprised an initial strength of five Dental Officers and 12 Othr Ranks. Prior to this time, everything west of the Ontario/Manitoba border was served by 11 Dental Company.

In the early stages, 14 Dental Company was responsible for the provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, or as previously referred to as Military Districts 10 and 12. 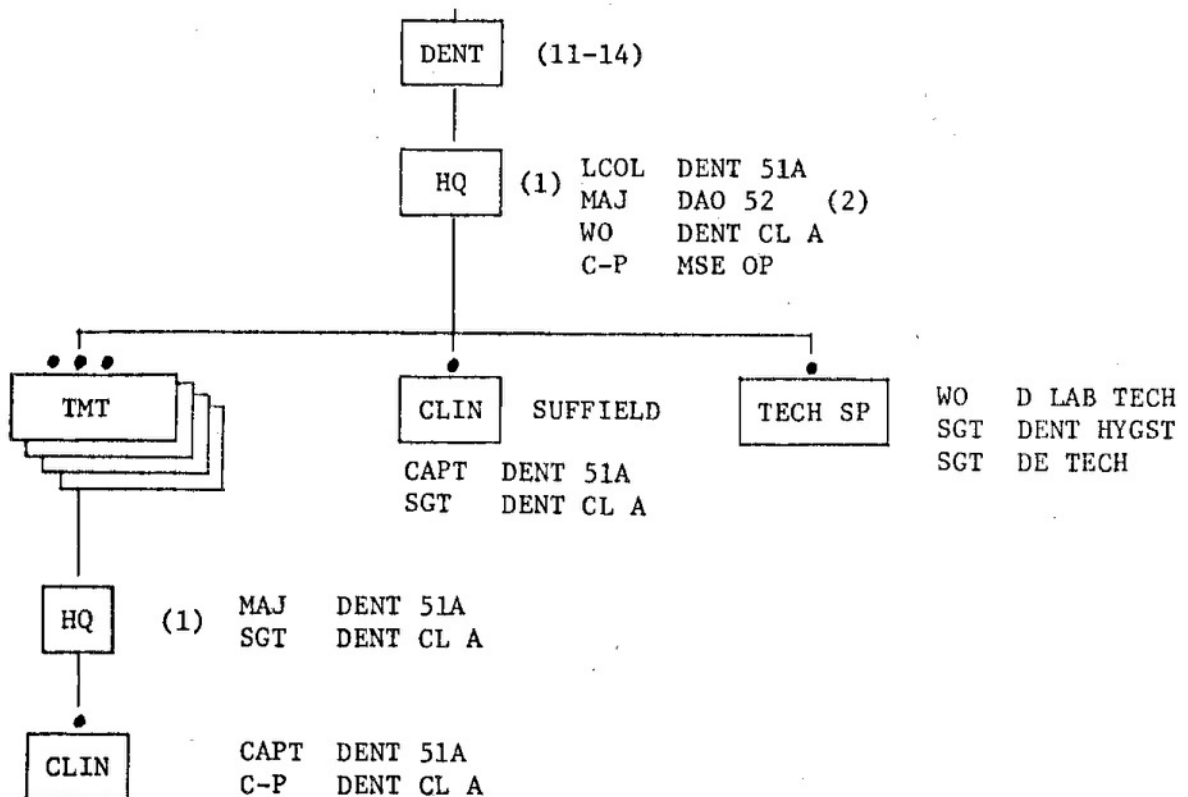

CFB LAHR BATTLEFIELD STUDY - DIEPPE RAID

Of all the engagements involving Canadian forces in the Second World War, none created such continuing discussion and controversy as the raid on Dieppe on 19 August 1942. Nearly 5000 Canadian troops participated in the battle in an attempt to achieve very difficult, if not impossible, objectives. With the end result, many lost their lives or became prisoners of war for the duration of the conflict.

From 8 to 10 May 1984, three officers of 35 Dental Unit, LCol Cragg, Maj Bullock and Capt Deziel, had the opportunity to relive the events of the Dieppe Raid through a Battlefield Study hosted by CFB Lahr. The program consisted of a one day lecture/film presentation followed by a two day field trip to Dieppe to tour the actual area where the conflict occurred. Credit must go to the organizers, Capt Schwager and Capt Champagn, who obtained two excellent speakers, Dr. John Sweetman (a lecturer at Sandhurst Military College, England) and Brigadier Young (a retired British Army Officer who participated with #3 Commando as a Major during the actual conflict). The presentations and follow up discussion with these two knowledgeable gentlemen assisted immensely in obtaining a good perspective of the operation.

Immediately following the lectures, we were whisked away by bus to catch a DASH 7 for the flight from Lahr to Rouen, France, and the from there by bus to Dieppe. The travel arrangements restored my faith in military transport as everything went off with clockwork precision.

The two day field trip was a very rewarding experience that brought home to all, the immense difficulties facing the troops as they attempted to reach their objectives. Each of the five beaches where troops landed were visited and a short commentary was made by the lecturer to refresh our memories as to the events that took place in that particular area. Everyone had ample opportunity to inspect the beaches and coastal defences or just sit and contemplate events that took place there some forty-two years previous. One of the highlights was Brigadier Young's vivid account of his leading #3 Commando in an attack on a coastal battery. The group also toured the Dieppe Musee Militaire in Pourville that houses many military relics relating to the raid.

The last item on the itinerary before returning to Lahr was a short visit to the Dieppe Canadian War Cemetery to pay our respects to the some 700 Canadians buried there, most of them victims of the Dieppe Raid. The many long double rows of white headstones were a sobering reminder of the cost of freedom.

All participants found this years Battlefield Study a very enjoyable as well as educational experience.
